ACCIDENT TO ROYAL AIR FORCE JAGUAR GR1s

XZ105 AND XZ110

Date:

16 June 1983

Parent Airfield:

RAF Laarbruch, Germany

Place of Accident:

Goose Bay, Canada

Crews:

One pilot in each aircraft

Casualties:

Two Major Injuries

CIRCUMSTANCES

1. A Jaguar squadron had deployed to Canada for the purpose of tactical training, and on the afternoon of 16 June 1983, a 3 aircraft formation was recovering to Goose Bay Airfield for a visual join into the circuit. The circuit direction for the runway in use was specified as left hand, and the formation leader had pre-briefed that the join would be accomplished by the aircraft moving from tactical formation into close echelon starboard for a left hand break. However, on contacting Air Traffic Control, the formation was instructed to fly a right hand circuit, so the leader ordered his section to move from tactical formation into close echelon port. During this formation change the No 2 and No 3 aircraft collided. There was a loud explosion, both aircraft caught fire, and their pilots ejected. The aircraft crashed into water surrounding the airfield, and were destroyed; the pilots were rescued safely.

CAUSE

2. While the aircraft were moving from tactical formation into close echelon port, the pilot of the No 3 aircraft lost sight of the No 2. When this occurred, he should have discontinued his movements and pulled up and out of the formation in order to re-establish visual contact with the No 2, whom it was his responsibility to avoid. He did not do so, and a collision resulted.

SUBSEQUENT ACTIONS

- 3. Pilots are now briefed to expect circuits to be flown in either direction at this airfield, as instructed by Air Traffic Control.
- 4. Instructions which specify the procedures to be adopted by pilots of fastjet aircraft joining in close formation have also been clarified.

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
